"Because the Bible tells me so" isn't going to cut it when today's kids run into skeptics that will tear such reasoning to philosophical shreds. So then, Ren took it upon himself to come up with a more structured approach to his daughter's upbringing in the Christian Family. Over the course of three months, he had a series of thirteen 5-10 minute conversations with her about God and Church. Ren used CS Lewis' approach to explaining Christianity because he wants his daughter to have it "written upon her heart" (Heb 10:16) and not just a bunch of regurgitated memory verses.
