1990-09-01 Wisla Publishers of Baton Rouge, La. have set September 30, 1991 as the date for publication of a new version of MERRY-GO-ROUND-FAMILY, a book that was a choice of the Junior Literary Guild in 1954. Matthew Turner had bought a merry-go-round when his daughter, Marie, was only ten years old. With his wife, his daughter, & a helper named "Mike" they went to county fairs & summer resorts to earn a living for their family. The original story of their adventure has lost none of its charm. Rather, its beauty has been enhanced by color illustrations painted by the

author, Mimi Bolton, an artist whose canvasses have been widely exhibited in the U.S. & abroad.
