To early modern England, Greece was an enigma. Focussing, for the first time, on Shakespeare's 'Greek' texts (*Venus and Adonis*, *The Comedy of Errors*, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, *Love's Labour's Lost*, *Troilus and Cressida*, *Timon of Athens*, *King Lear*, *Pericles and The Two Noble Kinsmen*), the volume considers how Shakespeare's use of antiquity and Greek myth intersects with early modern perceptions of the country and its empire.
